Interpretation to Implementation

- I. Purpose of Interpretation
 - A. All location and interpretation of Scripture is for nothing without implementation.
- II. Purpose of Implementation
 - A. All implementation should lead to works that are pleasing to God.
 - 1. 2 Cor. 5:15, James 3:13, Titus 1:1
 - B. We must not just think that it is enough to get the job done; God cares about *how* it is done and about what is happening in the life of the one who is doing it.

Implementation in Practice

- I. Decide if this is a Biblically Directed or Biblically Derived Command
 - A. Biblically Directed A method specifically prescribed as such in the Bible.
 - B. Biblically Derived A method devised by the Christian himself in accordance with and within the framework of biblical principles in order to fulfill a biblical command to which there is attached no biblically directed method.
 - C. Titus 2:2-5 is a directive. *How* you fulfill this command will be derived.

II. Make sure that your motives are righteous.

God is not only concerned about the *what*, but He is also concerned about the *why*.

- A. What should be our motive for everything that we do?
- B. Right things can be done by right persons for the wrong reasons.
- C. This means that sometimes we must devise ways and means for doing things that we don't really feel like doing. We will do so because God told us to.
 - 1. God created us to be obedience oriented, not feelingsoriented.
 - 2. Feelings often begin to change as you obey.
